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Sam Crump, Ken Foley, Bill Roventini, and Mayor Kathy Austin said little about the proposal last week, but none has voiced opposition.

Only Anne Magnie, the Council's strongest environmental advocate, questioned whether the golf plan violates the spirit and intent of Laguna

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"I certainly have nothing against golf," said Magnie, but "Golf courses can be put elsewhere. The Laguna can't be put elsewhere."

The Sebastopol Council took no action last week. The Santa Rosa Council is expected to vote on whether to proceed with the

### Laguna cleanup
